# **BUTLER COUNTY UNITED WAY ANNOUNCES 2022-23 FUNDING AWARDS**

**Butler County, OH** – Butler County United Way is pleased to announce its funding decisions for the 2022-2023 funding cycle and is excited to invest nearly **\$800,000** into programming in communities across Butler County.

Volunteers from various industries and communities in Butler County served on impact committees where they invested their time and energy into reviewing this year's proposals for funding. Award decisions were based on the quality of the proposals and their alignment with Butler County United Way's vision and mission. Over the next year, Butler County United Way will provide funding for agencies and programs that will support one of the three major focuses of **education, financial stability/basic needs, and healthy lives.** 

This year Butler County United Way will directly allocate **\$247,000** to **12 educational programs** that serve children as well as adults. Those funded include:

**Six (6) special collaborations** were awarded **\$150,000** in funding for their multiple programs supporting all three pillars of **education**, **financial stability/basic needs**, **and healthy lives**.

 Booker T. Washington Community Center Collaboration received \$38,000 in funding through the lead agency, Great Miami Valley YMCA, as well as other partners including the City of Hamilton, Boys & Girls Club of Hamilton, Fitton Center for Creative Arts, Miami University, Hamilton City School District, OSU Extension Office, Envision Partnerships, United Methodist Church Food Program, Dohn 22+, ELL, Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of America, YWCA, SELF, Central Connections, Senior Council on Aging, Hamilton Police Department and Badin High School.

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- Home Visitation Collaboration received \$30,000 in funding through the lead agency, Butler County Educational Service Center, along with partner agencies Every Child Succeeds coordinated through Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center.
- Parent Project Collaboration received \$27,000 in funding through the lead agency, Catholic Charities of Southwestern Ohio in collaboration with Butler County Family and Children First Council, Butler County Juvenile Justice Center, and Hamilton City School District.
- **Comprehensive Hunger Relief Program** collaboration received **\$45,000** in funding through the lead agency Shared Harvest Foodbank in collaboration with Serve City and The Village Food Pantry.
- Building a Healthier Community collaboration received \$1,000 in funding through the lead agency Talawanda School District in conjunction with The Coalition for a Healthy Community – Oxford Area.
- Youth Wellbeing and Resilience Collaboration received \$9,000 in funding through the lead agency Fairfield City School District in conjunction with Fairfield Prevention Coalition and Envision Partnerships.

In addition to the monetary awards given in support of these partner agency programs, Butler County United Way is also very proud of the fact that through their Building Block volunteer events that were consistently held throughout the year, an additional **\$742,480 in goods and services** were donated by community members, local agencies, organizations and companies. The services included the value of the volunteer hours that were donated by generous Butler County citizens. The received goods were redistributed in packages such as literacy and hygiene kits, socks for the homeless population, as well as Thanksgiving and Christmas care packages, to name a few.

The total impact to Butler County residents **exceeded \$1.5 million** and can be contributed to the generosity of our community, a true testament to how everyone giving a little can have a huge impact on the lives of so many.
