From our President and CEO...



It is my pleasure to present our 2017-2018 Annual Report. We are proud of our continued focus on impact and outcomes in the communities we serve. Last year, through your generous donations, we helped over 55,000 people in Butler County through our three pillars of focus: Education, Financial Stability and Health. As a result of your donations, allow me to catalog some of the amazing outcomes that were achieved through the programs our partner agencies provide.

In the category of education, 3.241 children received literacy support leading to greater success at school; 2,805 youth increased their social competencies, life skills and commitment to learning; and 96% of children age 0-5 achieved developmental milestones. With a focus on financial stability, 380 low-income homeowners receive home repair assistance including modification services and mobility improvements; 2,485 people received employment counseling and career mentorship; and 4.1 million pounds of food were distributed to hungry residents in Butler County. Under the health umbrella, 2,218 people received preventive care support leading to healthier lives; 20,723 nights

were provided to individuals who received emergency supplies and shelter; and 4,318 youths and adults reduced risky behaviors such as alcohol and drug abuse. We partner with United Way Worldwide for two important programs: My Free Taxes put \$952,514 back in the hands of hardworking Butler County residents through our free tax support service and 17,000 people saved more than \$1.6 million on their prescription medication via the **FamilyWize** prescription plan.

In February of 2018, we successfully merged the United Way of Oxford, Ohio and Vicinity into Butler County United Way. We began discussions with the Oxford Board of Directors in the summer of 2017. Carol Hauser, Board President, did a marvelous job holding the organization together after the resignation of their Executive Director in early 2017. The Oxford Board will remain as an Advisory Board for the next three years, make the funding decisions in regard to the Oxford Area Requests for Proposal. In addition, two of the former Oxford Board members, Carol Hauser, Miami University (Retired) and Amy Macechko, Talawanda Local Schools, have seats on the Butler County United Way Board of Trustees. In addition to the board seats, Carol Havens joined our staff as the Oxford Area Relationship Manager. Carol has lived in Oxford most of her life and is well connected in the community. We are excited about the future impact we will be able to make in the Oxford Area.

We have continued to focus on volunteer efforts. Last year, we logged 25,383 volunteer hours of service and increasing over the previous year by 183%! In addition to volunteer hours, we were able to give back approximately \$428,000 through in-kind donations from our corporate partners and individuals through our community Building Block events. Those donations became hygiene kits, chemo care packages, literacy kits, and schools supplies. We have partnered with Miami University on two projects: CommUnity Connect and Student United Way. CommUnity Connect is a community database we provide for community organizations to list their volunteer opportunities throughout the county and where community members can search out volunteer projects in which to participate. The Student United Way chapter on Miami University's Oxford campus was a project spearheaded by our Miami student intern Emily Callahan. We are excited about the additional impact this student group will provide.

We continue to focus our funding on collective impact which goes beyond single-issue solutions and temporary fixes. We need to look at ways to organize across a broad group of organizations to help implement effective and meaningful change. We embarked on a journey last year in regard to Workforce Development with community partners and while we did not resolve some of the issues that face the workforce, we did learn some lessons. One is that there are many organizations and companies involved in this arena and there is duplication of efforts that need to be addressed. Also, the dynamics and opportunities change as the unemployment rate continues to decrease. We will continue to research this area and see where gaps exist and step in as needed to help fill those gaps.

In closing, we all have a stake in what befalls our fellow man. We all benefit when a child succeeds in school, when someone finds a job that will help them provide for their family, or when more people are able to access quality, affordable health care. The solutions we create for our communities in Butler County go beyond short-term charity for a few. We envision a world where every community is a strong one, with jobs that pay a livable wage, good schools and a healthy environment. We engage people and organizations in innovative solutions that are transforming that vision into reality.

We rise or fall together. With your support, we are reaching for great new heights.

OXFORD MERGER

Effective February 1, 2018, United Way of Oxford, Ohio and Vicinity was merged into Butler County United Way following extensive discussions. For several years, Butler County United Way had been a partner in providing the additional operational support needed to maintain United Way of Oxford as a stand-alone organization. This merger achieved administrative stability and reduced administrative costs, which will ultimately result in increased financial support for partner agencies supporting the Oxford area.

Butler County United Way was established in 1920 and had 2017 net assets of over \$1.7 million. Including the assets from United Way of Oxford, which was established in 1941, the assets of the combined organization reach nearly \$1.9 million. Under the agreement, an Oxford Advisory Board will remain in place to steer the allocation process for the Oxford area. In addition, a minimum of two Oxford representative seats will be held on the Butler County United Way Board of Trustees. These seats will initially be filled by Carol Hauser, former Oxford Board President and Amy Macechko, former Oxford Board Vice President.

A celebration of the merger was held on Monday, February 26, 2018 at The Knolls of Oxford, 6727 Contreras Road, Oxford, Ohio 45056. All donors, board members, community officials and staff were invited to attend.




